C. Director's Report

i. Bimonthly TIP Project Statuses

Peter Mohr, WAMPO explained that the WAMPO Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) includes a Reasonable Progress Policy, under which projects programmed to receive WAMPO-suballocated funding that are scheduled to start in the current Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) or that have started but not finished (including projects that started in prior FFYs) are to have progress reports every two months. The TIP Project Statuses report for August 2024 was shared.

ii. ITS Architecture Kickoff Meeting

Mr. Mohr shared that the contract for a consultant to develop a Regional Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) Architecture was approved by the Transportation Policy Body (TPB) at their meeting on August 13, 2024. WAMPO staff and consultants have begun coordinating and plan to schedule an ITS Architecture kickoff meeting in September 2024.

iii. Upcoming Project Selection Committee (PSC) Meetings

Mr. Mohr shared that from September 15, 2023, through February 2, 2024, WAMPO held a combined Call for Projects for Metropolitan Transportation Plan 2050 (MTP 2050) and the FFY2025-FFY2028 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). On August 13, 2024, the TPB adopted the FFY2025-FFY2028 TIP. In October 2024, the Project Selection Committee (PSC) will convene to recommend a fiscally constrained list of priority projects for MTP 2050.

iv. Annual Bicycle and Pedestrian Count

Kim Negrete, WAMPO, explained that every year, WAMPO coordinates an annual count of bicycle and pedestrian activity across the region. The data collected during this count help to estimate the number of people who bicycle, walk, and run, and the locations where they do so. To gather this information, WAMPO relies on a team of volunteers to spend a short period of time counting pedestrians and bicycle riders at designated locations. The 2024 dates and times available to volunteer are Wednesday, September 11, 10:00 AM-12:00 PM and/or 5:00 PM-7:00 PM; Thursday, September 12, 10:00 AM-12:00 PM and/or 5:00 PM-7:00 PM; and Saturday, September 14, 12:00 PM-2:00 PM. Discussion:

Chair Kessler asked how many more volunteers are needed. Ms. Negrete said that about half of the count locations have volunteers for all necessary dates and times. WAMPO still needs about a dozen volunteers to fill the remaining time slots at the other count locations.

v. Safety Updates

Ms. Negrete said that safety is at the forefront of transportation planning and provided an update on recent safety-related initiatives. WAMPO staff are currently developing a contract with the selected Safe Routes to School (SRTS) planning-assistance consultant

and anticipate work to begin soon. For the joint WAMPO/KDOT Behavioral Safety Grants, one applicant, Bike Walk Wichita, has been awarded a grant to conduct a media campaign geared toward the safety of non-motorists. WAMPO was awarded an SS4A Planning and Demonstration grant in December 2023, in the amount of \$940,000; staff are working with the FHWA and member jurisdictions to get eligible projects lined up and the grant agreement executed.

Discussion:

Paul Gunzelman asked which consultant was selected for the development of Safe Routes to School (SRTS) plans. Ms. Negrete said that the contract is under development and until it is ready to be awarded, the selection will not be made public.

vi. Kansas Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Survey, available through August 30, 2024

Ms. Negrete shared that the Kansas Safe Routes to Schools program is expanding and in the process of developing a strategic plan. Please help ensure the program is reflective of and useful to communities throughout Kansas by taking the survey by August 30, 2024.

Ms. Negrete made an announcement regarding the USDOT Reconnecting Communities Pilot grant program, which focuses on projects that reconnect communities by removing, retrofitting, or mitigating transportation facilities that create barriers to connectivity. 5. Discussion/Updates

A. 2024 Major State Corridors Daily VMT/AADT Report

Mr. Mohr explained that daily Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) and Annual Average Daily Traffic (AADT) are widely used data elements in transportation planning and traffic engineering. Using KDOT data, WAMPO staff have developed a 2024 Daily VMT and AADT Report detailing these metrics for seven (7) major corridors in the WAMPO region: I-35, I-135, I-235, US-54, K-15, K-96, and K-254. These roadways are vital for commuters, commerce, and emergency services, serving as conduits for economic activity and regional development. They also constitute the majority of the state and interstate highway system in the region. The presentation included an overview of the report. Going forward, WAMPO staff intend to make this an annual report, posted online. Figures and data

from the 2024 report will be incorporated into Metropolitan Transportation Plan 2050 (MTP 2050), in Chapter 3: Existing Conditions.

B. MTP 2050 Public Engagement Round 3 Summary

Markey Jonas, WAMPO, shared that the third round of public engagement for Metropolitan Transportation Plan 2050 (MTP 2050) was conducted from May 20, 2024, through June 30, 2024. WAMPO staff utilized several strategies, including a survey, to engage with the public about the development of MTP 2050 and how it will help shape the transportation network. 474 survey responses were recorded and analyzed. The purpose of this round of public engagement was to gather opinions on transportation issues & policy alternatives and to document transportationmode usage trends within the WAMPO region. The survey was an engagement tool for collecting feedback from the public and is not intended to provide a scientific, statistically valid representation of all the region's residents, but will be considered during the development of MTP 2050 and other long-range planning efforts. Ms. Jonas provided an overview of the nondemographic questions from the MTP 2050 Public Engagement Round 3 survey, the most common response to each question, and the frequency with which that response was chosen. All engagement efforts and survey responses will also be discussed in the MTP 2050 publicengagement appendix. C. Wichita Downtown Parking Plan

Troy Anderson, City of Wichita, provided an overview of the City of Wichita's Downtown Parking Plan. The presentation highlighted the complexities of parking management, emphasizing that "free" parking is never truly free, and drew from established experts in the field. Mr. Anderson highlighted the impact of excessive surface parking on downtown density and vibrancy, comparing Wichita's situation to other cities. Tracing the history of Wichita's parking policies, many recommendations from past studies, like the 2009 Downtown Parking and Mobility Master Plan, remain unimplemented. Recent efforts, including extensive community engagement and a 2023 City Council endorsement, aim to address these gaps. The current parking fund struggles to cover basic operations, with insufficient revenue to support operations and maintenance. The plan recommends rebalancing parking utilization and implementing new technologies to enhance the downtown area's vibrancy. Lastly, the presentation stressed that while financial sustainability is crucial, the broader goals of improving downtown density and vibrancy are equally important. D. Regional Transit Implementation Plan Update

Bill Troe, SRF, provided an update on the Regional Transit Implementation Plan, emphasizing the final phase of narrowing down transit service alternatives based on community interest and participation. Recent efforts have been focused on identifying which of the regional transit service alternatives might be most viable based on the community perspective of each WAMPO jurisdiction. Feedback has been received from about half of the jurisdictions. The project team is working to refine concepts, which will be divided into short-term recommendations, based on immediate needs and community interest, and aspirational alternatives, which aim to address broader regional goals, including improved commuter access and enhanced transit services within communities. Additionally, a new focus on employer coordination was introduced, with ongoing discussions involving key regional employers to explore potential partnerships and funding opportunities. The goal is to have a draft document by mid-October. There will be an employer focus group meeting on Monday, September 16, 2024, from 8:30 AM to 10:00 AM at the Wichita Workforce Center, 2021 N. Amidon #1100, Wichita, KS 67203.

Executive Summary

The Wichita Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (WAMPO) opened the public comment period for its 2025 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP), September 9, 2024, through October 8, 2024. The UPWP is WAMPO's primary budgeting document for planning activities. The draft 2025 Unified Planning Work Program and additional information are available at <u>www.wampo.org/upwp</u>.

Background

The Wichita Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (WAMPO) opened the public comment period for its 2025 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP), September 9, 2024, through October 8, 2024. Public comments received during this period will be reported to and considered by the WAMPO Transportation Policy Body (TPB), which will decide whether to approve the 2025 UPWP at their November 12, 2024, meeting.

The Unified Planning Work Program is WAMPO's primary budgeting document for planning activities during the year (January 1-December 31). Funding for the UPWP comes from various sources, including federal Comprehensive Planning Grant (CPG) funds, which require a 20% local match (i.e., 80% federal funding, 20% local funding). The CPG/local-match expenditures in the 2025 UPWP total \$2,786,495.

In 2025, the planning priorities and activities will include, among other things:

- » Development of Metropolitan Transportation Plan 2050 (MTP 2050).
- Safety initiatives and activities, including supporting the ICT Safe Coalition, implementing the Comprehensive Safety Action Plan (CSAP), facilitating the use of awarded Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Demonstration Grant funds, and Safe Routes to School (SRTS) plan development.
- » Bicycle and pedestrian planning, including development of the Regional Active Transportation Plan.
- » Multimodal and Complete Streets planning to increase safe and accessible options for multiple travel modes for people of all ages and abilities.
- Public transit and paratransit planning, including completing the Regional Transit Implementation Plan.
- » Engaging and involving the public and stakeholders in transportation decision-making in the region. Updating the WAMPO Title VI Program and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Plan.
- » Administration of the FFY2025-FFY2028 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).
- > Transportation data collection and modeling. Updating the Regional Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) Architecture.
- » Participation in and support of community and planning partners with regionally significant projects.

Executive Summary

The TAC is asked to make a recommendation to the TPB on proposed Amendment #2 to the WAMPO FFY2025-FFY2028 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). Amendment #2 is a regularly scheduled TIP amendment and would maintain the fiscal constraint of the FFY2025-FFY2028 TIP. The Public Comment period for Amendment #2 opened on August 30, 2024, and ran through September 13, 2024. No public comments were received.

Background

Amendment #2 to the WAMPO FFY2025-FFY2028 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) is a regularly scheduled amendment. It is the second amendment for this TIP, **adding six (6) new projects**, **removing two (2) projects**, and **modifying one (1) project**. The below-linked Amendment #2 summary also provides notice of **administrative adjustments to four (4) projects**, which do not require approval by the TAC or TPB. The Public Comment period for Amendment #2 opened on August 30, 2024, and ran through September 13, 2024. No public comments were received. The FFY2025-FFY2028 TIP was adopted by the WAMPO Transportation Policy Body (TPB) on August 13, 2024, and may be found at <u>www.wampo.org/transportation-improvement-program</u>. The TAC is now asked to provide a recommendation on the proposed project additions/removals/modifications.

Fiscal Considerations

Federal regulations require that the TIP be "fiscally constrained," meaning that there are enough projected revenues to cover the costs of the projects listed in the TIP. After accounting for the proposed changes (see below table), the TIP is fiscally constrained for the period FFY2025-FFY2028.



Executive Summary

The FHWA and FTA jointly issued a Planning Rule that establishes various performance measures to assess roadway safety (PM1), pavement and bridge condition (PM2), system performance and freight movement (PM3), transit asset management (TAM), and transit safety. For these performance measures, MPOs are required to either set their own targets or support the targets set by their respective state DOTs. In 2023, WAMPO chose to support KDOT in achieving its federal performance-measure targets. The TAC is now asked to make a recommendation to the TPB on whether to continue to support KDOT's federal performance-measure targets in 2024.

Performance-Based Planning

Performance management is a strategic approach to connect investment and policy decisions to help achieve performance goals. Performance measures (PMs) are quantitative criteria used to evaluate progress. Performance-measure targets are the benchmarks against which progress is assessed using available data.

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) jointly issued a Planning Rule to document changes in the statewide and metropolitan planning processes consistent with the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century (MAP-21) Act and the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act. This rule specifies the requirements for state Departments of Transportation (DOTs) and Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) to implement a performance-based approach to planning and programming.

Federal Performance Measures (PMs)

Under the Planning Rule framework, the FHWA has three performance-measure rules and the FTA has a transit-asset-management rule and a transit-safety rule. These rules establish performance measures to assess roadway safety (PM1), pavement and bridge condition (PM2), system performance and freight movement (PM3), transit asset management (TAM), and transit safety. The Planning Rule and the FHWA and FTA performance-measure rules also specify how MPOs should set targets, report performance, and integrate performance management into their Long-Range Transportation Plans (LRTPs), which are also referred to as Metropolitan Transportation Plans (MTPs), and Transportation Improvement Programs (TIPs). MPOs may either set their own targets for each performance measure or support the targets set by their respective state DOTs.

In 2023, WAMPO supported the state PM1, PM2, PM3, and TAM targets developed by the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT). In 2024, all of these targets except for the PM1 (safety) targets remain unchanged. To support KDOT in achieving these targets, WAMPO incorporates evaluation criteria for safety, pavement/bridge condition, and traffic congestion into the project-selection process. WAMPO staff recommend continuing to support KDOT in reaching these targets in 2024.

Executive Summary

WAMPO's 2024 Title VI Report was completed on September 3, 2024, and demonstrates WAMPO's efforts to create and maintain a transparent and inclusive planning process by intentionally integrating Title VI, Environmental Justice (EJ), and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) principles into the transportation planning process. To date, no Title VI complaints have ever been received by WAMPO.

Background

WAMPO ensures full compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987, Executive Order 12898 on Environmental Justice (EJ), Executive Order 13166 on Limited English Proficiency (LEP), and related statutes and regulations in all programs and activities. WAMPO's Annual Title VI Report demonstrates WAMPO's efforts to create and maintain a transparent and inclusive planning process by integrating Title VI, EJ, and LEP principles into the WAMPO transportation planning process and intentionally reaching out to traditionally underserved populations.

Title VI, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d et seq., was enacted as part of the landmark Civil Rights Act of 1964. It prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, and national origin in programs and activities receiving federal financial assistance. WAMPO's Title VI program includes administrative/oversight activities, regional demographic analysis, consideration of board/committee demographic makeup, and planning/programming activities, per federal requirements.

The WAMPO Title VI Program Manual, Title VI Discrimination Complaint Form, Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Plan, and other resources are available on the WAMPO website (<u>www.wampo.org/title-vi</u>) in English, Spanish, and Vietnamese. WAMPO annually develops a Title VI report that is submitted to KDOT and made available on the website. To date, no Title VI complaints have ever been received by WAMPO.

Without such a unified framework, opportunities for improving efficiency, safety, and data-sharing may be lost; at the extreme, a region could risk deploying incompatible or redundant technologies. The ITS Architecture ensures that all stakeholders are aligned on ITS gaps and priorities.

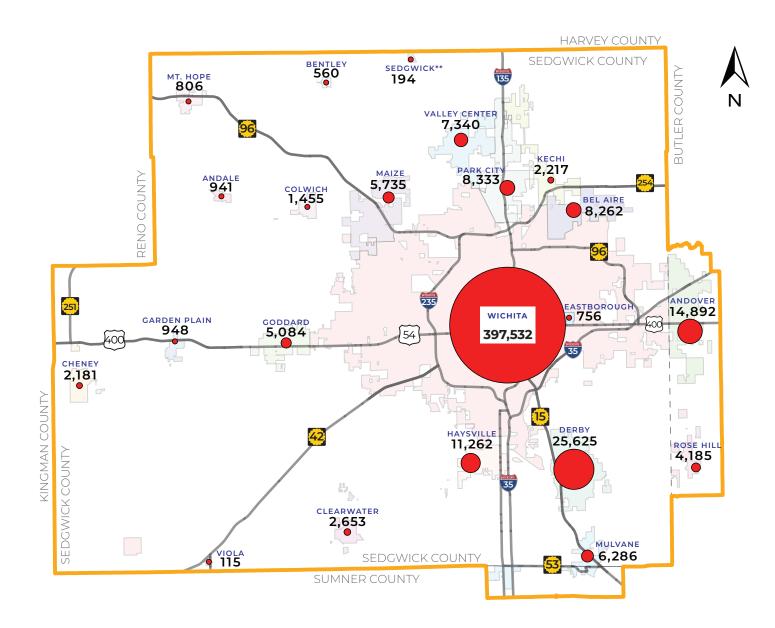


